Happy New Year 2025! The Deacons met on December 16 and discussed budget items, goals, and projects for the upcoming year. As we welcome 2025, we continue to focus on the needs within the congregation, community, and the world. Your support allows us to continue our various mission activities and projects.

The generosity of our congregation was exemplified with their donations to the 2-Cents-a-Meal monthly collection. The total for 2024 was \$1068.37. The proceeds provided financial support for Bread for the World and Warren Family Mission. Both nonprofits strive to eliminate food insecurity.

During the month of December, the Mission Committee purchased a washer and dryer for Someplace Safe with a generous Sheely Foundation grant given to the FPC Board of Deacons. Four boxes of household items were donated to the YWCA- The Wings. This Committee also had a global view by designating funds to some of the missions listed in the *Presbyterian Giving Catalog*. Funds were provided for Hygiene Kits, Health Education, for Mothers and Newborns, and Families of Chickens for farmers in developing nations. The Mission Committee always tries to improve living conditions both in our communities and around the world.

The Congregational Care Committee delivered twenty poinsettias to our Special Care Members. Many of the poinsettias were delivered while Christmas Caroling. We would like to thank the Craft Group for the "Pocket Angels," too. Also, if you have a January birthday, you should soon receive your birthday treat in the mail.

The Fellowship Committee was involved with the various Advent activities during December. Please remember there are donuts, bagels, and coffee before and after worship; please stop and enjoy fellowship during our cold winter months.

The Grocery/Lunch Distribution took place on December 17. The Fellowship Hall was a lively place. Fifty-six lunches were served, and everyone enjoyed a delicious holiday meal of ham, mashed potatoes, green beans, salad, and strawberry cobbler. During the luncheon, the students from the Chickadee Preschool provided entertainment for our guests' enjoyment. After lunch, 47 carts full of groceries were distributed. Appreciation and gratitude were expressed by all as they left with bags of food for their holiday tables.

A member of the church, who previously had been attending services regularly, stopped going. After a few weeks, the pastor decided to visit him.

The Lonely Ember

It was a chilly evening. The pastor found the man at home alone, sitting before a blazing fire. Guessing the reason for his pastor's visit, the man welcomed him, led him to a comfortable chair near the fireplace and waited.

The pastor made himself at home but said nothing. In the grave silence, he contemplated the dance of the flames around the burning logs. After some minutes, the pastor took the fire tongs, carefully picked up a brightly burning ember, and placed it to one side of the hearth all alone then, he sat back in his chair, still silent.

The host watched all this in quiet contemplation. As the one lone ember's flame flickered and diminished, there was a momentary glow and then its fire was no more. Soon it was cold and dead.

Not a word had been spoken since the initial greeting. The pastor glanced at his watch and realized it was time to leave. He slowly stood up, picked up the cold, dead ember and placed it back in the middle of the fire. Immediately it began to glow, once more with the light and warmth of the burning coals around it. As the pastor reached the door to leave, his host said with a tear running down his cheek, "Thank you so much for your visit and especially for the fiery sermon. I will be back in church next Sunday.

I did not write this story, once upon a time it came across my Facebook feed. We don't know why this man stopped coming to church. Did it start out as a legitimate reason like sickness or work that kept him away and then morphed into something that just got comfortable as he stayed home?

Did he not see, as the story might suggest, how the church sustained him in the same way that heap of burning coals fed the lonely ember? Perhaps he didn't realize that, in his absence, he was not benefitting from others; but he was not contributing to the welfare of the community either.

In the era of online streaming, pastors sometimes ask, "Are we making it too easy for people to stay home." Maybe that is how many see it. Some people might like to be home where they watch in their PJs, or maybe they watch later – forward through the boring part? Before long, that person may not be involved in the work of the church or contributing any kind of offering. Will it lead to people leaving the church altogether?

I answer that question with the bold assurance that our streaming is necessary and that it must continue beyond the pandemic. The equipment we have and those who generously give of their time and talents to capture, broadcast, and record our services bring the community to those who, for whatever reason, are not in our midst. What a blessing it is to have our homebound members seeing and hearing what goes on here each week. Our members who have relocated are with us from far away places, as are my own parents and Audwin each week.

Those of you who are online can attest to the fact that participation is happening. Not only are people signing in as we have asked for attendance purposes, but they are also saying good morning and welcoming others online in their chats. They comment on beautiful music, on people being recognized for certain things, or something said or done during the service that was meaningful. Just coming into view and waving during the passing of the peace gives those at home a feeling of presence as though they were here in this place. They have told me so.

I fully support those who join us virtually. For me, the story of the lonely ember isn't so much about being at the building. It's about the lack of participation in the life and work of the church. For that reason, I truly hope that we are all taking the time to reach out to one another. I often talk about community. As a faith community, we have a responsibility to one another. Thankfully, we live in a time where there are so many ways to connect with and communicate with each other and to come together for the common good as we serve our God. May we strive to be

part of it all and may we all be preachers of that fiery sermon. **Pastor Kelly**
